Traditional commentators took note of the name of this portion and the opening storyline: Chayyei Sarah translates literally as 'the lives of Sarah'. We open with the report of her death, and Abraham's negotiation that leads to the purchase of the double cave referred to as ha- Machpelah. The location is identified even today by a sacred building that has served both as Christian Church and Mosque in Hebron. Later generations used this cave for burial of three ancestral couples: Sarah and Abraham, Rebecca and Isaac, Leah and Jacob. So, why Chayyei Sarah? Beyond the obvious, that 'life' in Hebrew is called Chaiyyim—a dual form—interpretations take this as a cue to develop ideas about life and afterlife, although the concept is largely absent in Torah. Spiritual life, in contrast, is an essential focus of Torah and Judaism. Conceived as a parallel to the existence we know from experience, the spiritual life of every individual is eternal. Literally, that is outside time. Hence Sarah's physical life has come to an end, while her spirit remains. This is the essence of human experience. The narrative picks up, shifting focus to the second generation, to Isaac and Rebecca, and then their twin sons, Esau and Jacob. Struggles in life continue through these earliest generations of Jewish history. The details are meticulous, the insights into priorities and customs are rich, the culture of the ancient world made accessible across millennia as Hebrew Scripture took its place in Western, then World, Civilization. Our reading focuses on our contemporary struggle to maintain a balance between chayyei sha'ah—the moment—and chayyei olam—eternity. Let the story unroll through the days and weeks ahead.
