# SHABBAT SHALOM! Welcome to Temple David

In contrast to the majesty of last week's Torah portion, with the ascent of Moses capped by the revelation at Mount Sinai, the texts offered as a civil code in formation in this week's reading, Mishpatim, sets a tone of recognition and concern with society where we find ourselves—with those less empowered in the ancient patriarchy. That includes women, landless, and others who fall upon hard times. Over the generations, the definition of privilege changed, though it was only 200 years ago that enslavement was abolished in Western Nations. In the early history of the British Empire from the homeland to the antipodes, debtors were transported to Australia and the colony that became the State of Georgia. Indentured individuals were present in colonial Virginia, too, while slavery remained a visible scar on society in many of the original 13 colonies that revolted against King George III. Other rules contained in this section are less foreign to us. The ethical ideals set the tone for contemporary concerns with the rights of animals, agricultural norms and social standards of decency and courtesy. We should act correctly without reference to our own benefit. Would that that were ever so. The concluding sections of the portion include the reminder: "You shall not boil a kid in its mother's milk." (Exodus 23:19) It has become the foundation of the dietary regulation regarding separation of milk and meat. That idea appears at the conclusion of a brief calendar of the three pilgrimages that remain critical parts of Jewish life.
